



"Forgive Us Our Debts..." Matthew 6:12, 14-15 • Alf Halvorson Preaching Sermon Notes written by Rev. Beth Case

The Lord's Prayer

- 1. Jesus begins the Lord's prayer with a plural first-person pronoun: *Our* Father..." The plural pronoun is used again to speak of our debts, and our debtors. What significance does this carry?
- 2. William Barclay says, "The fact that Jesus taught all [persons] to pray this prayer shows the universality of sin; and to pray this prayer a sense of sin is a prior requirement." What does Barclay mean? Agree or disagree?
- 3. Lewis Smedes writes extensively about forgiveness. Which of his following statements connects best with your understanding of forgiving others?
 - "When we forgive evil we do not excuse it, we do not tolerate it, we do not smother it. We look the evil full in the face, call it what it is, let its horror shock and stun and enrage us, and only then do we forgive it."
 - "You will know that forgiveness has begun when you recall those who hurt you and feel the power to wish them well."
 - "To forgive is to set a prisoner free and discover that the prisoner was you."

During this series, Pray Like Jesus, the sermon notes will discuss various models of prayer. Following a brief introduction and discussion of the week's prayer practice, you will find some practical suggestions for exercising that model of prayer. We encourage you to try these individually, or as a small group.

Praying Through Barriers

Scripture teaches that prayer can and does make a positive impact in the world and in our personal lives (see Isaiah 38 or Acts 12:1-19). But Scripture also gives evidence of times when our requests seem to go unanswered. Maybe you have been consistent in prayer. You have trusted. You have pled. You have even postured before God. And yet you find yourself confused, disappointed, hurt, or even angry at God. You may even be ready to give up on prayer.

Did you know that the Apostle Paul and Jesus experienced disappointment in prayer? Ultimately, prayer is not simply about results, but about relationship. God is not a magic genie, waiting to fulfill our every wish. Rather, God wants us to interact with him, to tell him our hopes, our fears, our frustrations. God wants us to wrestle with him in prayer until our desires mirror His. And all the while, He promises never to leave us. And He wants us to be involved with Him as He works out His will here on earth, as in heaven.

Read the following Scriptures one-at-a-time. What does each one say about prayer?

- Psalm 66:18 If I had cherished iniquity in my heart, the Lord would not have listened.
- Proverbs 16:9 The human mind plans the way, but the Lord directs the steps.
- Isaiah 55:9 For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways and My thoughts than your thoughts.
- Isaiah 59:2 (ESV) But your iniquities have made a separation between you and your

God, and your sins have hidden His face from you so that He does not hear.

- Matthew 26:39 And going a little farther, Jesus threw Himself on the ground and prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from Me; yet not what I want but what You want."
- 2 Corinthians 12:8-9 Three times I appealed to the Lord about this, that it would leave me, but He said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." (Paul's words)
- James 5:16 Therefore confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another, so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective.

Put It Into Practice

(Choose one to practice with your small group, and one to practice on your own.)

Scripture tells us that when sin is unconfessed, or obedience incomplete, our prayers can be hindered. In other words, our relationship with our Heavenly Father is in need of repair.

- 1. Set aside some time to think about other people in your life. In the presence of God, ask "Who have I hurt with my words, or actions, or attitudes?" When the Holy Spirit brings to mind a name, confess your feelings about that person to God. Ask for His forgiveness (He promises it! 1 John 1:9). If appropriate, apologize to the one you have injured.
- 2. Read Psalm 103:8-14 aloud (or have it read to you). Remember how deeply God loves you, and how willingly He offers forgiveness. Turn to the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:1-17). Read slowly, asking God if there is:
 - a. a sin to confess
 - b. a command to keep
 - c. a step to take

Ask God for help. If in a group setting, return to the group. Re-read Psalm 103:8-14 (in unison).

3. Read the following Scriptures about God's forgiveness. Write your honest response as a prayer:

Have you received this forgiveness? Is there someone whom you need to forgive? What would it take for you to offer forgiveness?

4. Discuss, or journal about, this quote by C. S. Lewis: "The terrible thing, the almost impossible thing, is to hand over your whole self--all your wishes and precautions--to Christ. But it is far easier than what we are all trying to do instead. For what we are trying to do is to remain what we call 'ourselves."
