LOOKING AHEAD TO NEXT YEAR

As you know, we have a wonderful "Grandpa" program during

which the children have the opportunity to work with a "grandpa" and have help building whatever their imaginations desire. Since young children typically spend the majority of their time with women, this is a wonderful opportunity to interact with men – and sometimes men of two generations. That interaction is the object of this monthly activity. While it does involve woodworking, in reality, the grandpas do much of the building.

The Woodworking REACH class (held at the church after school) offers a great woodworking program designed for children to not only produce a finished product, but to learn about tools, how to care for them, how to use them safely, and so on. Taught by a talented Montessori-trained teacher, these classes offer your children a completely different woodworking experience.

I mention this just so you know that the two programs are very different and serve to develop different skills.

PARENT SURVEYS REPORT

Thank you to all you parents who took the time to complete and return the PARENT SURVEYS. It is very helpful to have your suggestions and very affirming to read your many wonderful comments.

MORE INFORMATION

Some of you have asked for more frequent reports. This is something we struggle with. We always contact parents when there are concerns; we admit we are often remiss at sending notes home about the good things. We continue to work on this. Next year we will go back to sending home the *What's Happenings* once a week instead of once a month. The kindergarten class will continue with the monthly *Happenings*, and we will augment that with some weekly information.

Please remember that we are happy to conference with you whenever you wish, either in person or on the phone. Do not hesitate to let us know of any questions or concerns that you might have at any time throughout the year.

PARTICIPATION

Some of you wished for more parent involvement. The handbook states that parents are welcome and encouraged to participate in many ways, we issue that invitation at our orientations and we try to remind you during the year. Please, don't be shy! Let your child's teacher know of your desire to participate. Come and read, help with a project, show a collection, a musical instrument...just let us know of your interests. We want you to feel comfortable and open with us. This is your school, too! Be involved!

<u>SCHEDULE</u>

One or two people wondered about why we have consecutive days rather than days spread out during the week. Research shows that children learn much better when they have immediate reinforcement. Even though it is a long time from Tuesday to the following Monday, the lessons learned on Monday and reinforced on Tuesday are more firmly entrenched in the children's developing brains. We see evidence of this when a 3 day child is absent on the middle day. Since children have a different concept of time than adults do, it is much easier for them to understand "tomorrow" rather than "the day after tomorrow" or "Wednesday".

WRITING/FINE MOTOR

A couple of moms wanted more time devoted to writing names and the alphabet. That is not an easy topic to address in a few short sentences, because the ability to write is dependent on many things. Children need to have lots of opportunities to strengthen their fine motor muscles; if their strength is lacking, they will have a difficult time holding a writing implement and will want to stop in a short time. That is why we do lots of activities such as playing with clay and chalk, using squeeze bottles and tweezers and the like. Also, children need to see print as important so the more they see parents using print (writing lists, letters, thank you notes, reading), the more interested they will be. Reading books to children and asking them questions about the story that encourage thinking such as "What do vou think would have happened if ...?" also makes them more interested in words and sounds. Singing songs and discovering the rhyming words, playing simple word games, learning nursery rhymes all are good ways to get children interested in writing.

That said, each of our classrooms has a letter/word wall on which we write new words that we have encountered and, not only do we look at the words and the sounds of the letters, but we look at the shapes of the letters – does it have straight lines? Curved lines? Angles? We write lots of books and the children are encouraged to dictate their "stories" to us and, as they are able, write their own. Each classroom has a writing center and the children are encouraged to use the various writing implements and various kinds of paper to write each day. We label, we write notes and memos, make lists and word graphs. We play games to learn sounds and syllabication. We count the words in a sentence. The pre-k children all have Handwriting Without Tears workbooks that they use and, of course the kindergarten children do lots of writing and journaling. It's fun to read their invented spelling words as they use all the sounds they have learned.

In the next few days I will post some information on our webpage about the stages of writing.

TEACHING RELIGION

One mom wanted to see scripture memory verses and bible stories in our curriculum. We do have chapel time with Ms Becky during which time she shares bible stories with the children. We also sing songs (some you will hear on the CD you'll receive before the end of the vear) about Jesus. In addition, we pray with the children at mealtime and live out our Christian teachings as we talk about God's plan and taking care of God's creations, ourselves included. We stress living out Jesus' teachings of loving one another and living the Golden Rule. These are things children seem to be able to understand very well.

<u>NAPS</u>

One mom asked if we could let families know if their child has napped.

That's a good suggestion and one which we will brainstorm. Thank you.

MORE ACADEMICS

Although the majority of you were very pleased with the balance of play and more formal learning, some of you asked about more academics.

We actually spend a great deal of time on reading, writing and math. In all of the classes, many of our transition activities are centered around rhyming words (games and silly songs), sounds of letters and finding words in our daily news or on our wall or in our Let's Find *Out* papers. We have large soft blocks on which we write math or literacy activities. The children toss the block and do the activity or answer the question. We work with our calendars for numeral recognition as well as literacy and days of the week, months of the year and seasons. We vote and count which thing won. We make graphs of all kinds.

The kindergarten children play lots of games designed to teach various concepts. Hangman with sight words is a favorite. There are also relay races using assorted math and literacy concepts, choral recitation, games for rhyming, games for using initial and ending sounds, math mystery equations and more. Even in music class we play a game about syllabication.

STRUCTURED PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES

The pre-ks and the kindergarten children participate in yoga as well as games like shadow tag and Red Rover and relay races. We move in different ways, play ball games and walk on balance beams of various kinds. Our multi-purpose room is often turned into an obstacle course on days when we cannot get outside, which are fortunately few and far between.

Many of you had such wonderful, affirming comments such as: "My child loves school and was always upset if he was too sick to go." "I feel like the teachers on staff are top notch! They truly care and love these kiddos and it's obvious they have been carefully selected." "Fun learning lessons, teachers recognize the strengths and weaknesses of each child and know how to encourage and motivate." "We love the home visits!" "PLAY vs book/desk work. Letting the children play to learn is so important."

Some of the school's strengths that were noted were: "Loving caring teachers and staff"; "My child feels welcomed"; "Academic learning is handson and lessons are interesting to the children"; "Outside playtime is important"; "Small welcoming environment where children are allowed to explore and learn through experience"; "Giving independence to the child with structure. Fostering a creative, thinking atmosphere. Understanding each child's needs. Constructive discipline that allows the child to make better choices." "Great staff!"

We periodically need teachers and substitute teachers. If any of you (particularly those of you with teaching backgrounds) or your friends might be interested, please let us know. That's how we get our best staff members.

PARENTING TIPS

Summer fun: incorporate physical fitness with literacy, science and family fun. Take a walk or a hike. Go bike riding together. Play catch, kick a ball around, have some relay races. Document what you see on your hike/walk. Take pictures and label them. Take your binoculars and magnifying glasses. Collect things. (Don't forget containers in which to bring treasures home.) Make a list of foods and drinks you might want to take along. Read The Ants Go Marching, We're Going on a Bear Hunt and Walking Through the Junale. Discuss the following things: what shape/size/color is it? Does it feel rough/smooth/sticky/prickly? What sounds do you hear? What do you smell? How do different plants smell? Read The Shape of Things, The Cloud Book and It Looked Like Spilled Milk. Lie on the ground and look up at the sky. Discuss the shapes of the clouds. Imagine what all they could be. On a sunny day, find your shadows and the shadows of objects. On the sidewalk, draw chalk lines around the shadows. Plat shadow tag. Take a variety of objects outside on a windy day and ask your child to predict which ones the wind will blow. Does it matter if the objects are upright or lying flat? Read *Gilberto and the Wind* and *Kite Flying.*
